Day 1 - Florence on Foot

	Iconic sights, local streets, and a taste of Florence
Santa Maria Novella	Start your day with the beautiful Renaissance façade of this historic church. Inside, you'll find frescoes by Ghirlandaio and a peaceful cloister — a quiet intro to the city.
Piazza del Duomo	The heart of Florence. Visit the Duomo , admire Giotto's Bell Tower , and the Baptistery of San Giovanni . Climb the dome or tower for breathtaking city views (book ahead).
Via dei Calzaiuoli	A lively pedestrian street filled with shops, cafes, and street musicians — perfect for people-watching on your way toward Piazza della Signoria.
Piazza della Signoria	Florence's open-air sculpture museum. See <i>David</i> (replica), <i>Perseus</i> , and Neptune's Fountain. Step inside Palazzo Vecchio's courtyard for a quick (free) look at civic grandeur.
Ponte Vecchio	Walk across the iconic 14th-century bridge lined with goldsmiths and jewelers. The views over the Arno are picture-perfect.
Piazza Santo Spirito	Cross the river for a coffee break or aperitivo in this charming, local-feeling square. A great spot to rest before continuing.
Basilica di Santo Spirito	A quiet, beautiful church with a local vibe and a wooden crucifix carved by a young Michelangelo. A peaceful, cultural pause before lunch or free time.
Ponte Santa Trinita	Cross the river and enjoy one of the best views of Ponte Vecchio. Take a lovely stroll along the north side of the river from Ponte Santa Trinita to Santa Croce , soaking in the riverside charm.
Santa Croce	Final stop of the day — burial site of Michelangelo, Galileo, and Machiavelli. The square outside is a lively spot at golden hour.

After a day of sightseeing, take a relaxed walk around **Ponte Vecchio**. The bridge and nearby streets come alive with street musicians and a lively atmosphere—perfect for soaking in Florence's charm and ending your day on a high note.

Day 2 - Museums & Art Treasures

A full day of Renaissance masterpieces		
Uffizi Gallery	Start your day at one of the most important art museums in the world. Arrive early with pre-booked tickets to avoid crowds. Allow plenty of time (up to 3 hours) to explore masterpieces by: Botticelli - The Birth of Venus, Primavera Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo, Caravaggio, Raphael Don't miss the corridor views of the Arno River and Ponte Vecchio	
Galleria dell'Accademia	Walk north to see Michelangelo's David , the most iconic sculpture in Florence. This museum is smaller and more focused — about 45–60 minutes is enough for most visitors.	
Museo dell'Opera del Duomo	Return toward the cathedral to visit this beautifully curated museum. Learn the story behind the Duomo's construction and see: • The original bronze Baptistery doors • Donatello's sculptures, including Mary Magdalene • Scale models of Brunelleschi's dome and architectural plans	
Piazza della Repubblica	End the day with a stroll through this elegant square. Originally the Roman forum, it's now home to Florence's most historic cafés, street musicians, and a classic carousel — a charming contrast to the day's deep dive into art history.	

Day 3 - Palaces, Gardens And Views

Slower pace, scenic views, and a final taste of Florence	
Pitti Palace	Step into Medici luxury. Explore the Palatine Gallery , Royal Apartments , and temporary exhibits. Rich interiors, dramatic art, and a look into noble life.
Boboli Gardens	Wander the expansive Renaissance gardens behind the palace — sculptures, fountains, hidden grottos, and panoramic spots over Florence's rooftops.
Artisan Streets	Stroll Via Maggio , Via dei Serragli , and surrounding side streets. These are filled with artisan workshops, vintage shops, and handmade goods — great for browsing or small souvenirs.
Piazzale Michelangelo (late afternoon / early evening)	End your trip with Florence's most iconic view. Walk up if you're feeling active, or grab a quick taxi or bus. The terrace offers sweeping views over the Duomo, Arno River, and Tuscan hills. Stay for golden hour or sunset if possible — it's unforgettable. † Tip: Bring a drink or snack, or just find a spot on the steps and take it all in. Great final photos!
Forte di Belvedere (Forte San Miniato)	Just a short walk from Piazzale Michelangelo, this peaceful fortress offers stunning views without the crowds — a great place to slow down and take it all in.

Getting Around Florence

From the Airport to the City

- Tram T2: Direct to Santa Maria Novella station in ~20 min (€1.50)
- Taxi: ~€22-25 flat fare, 15-20 min to the center

Getting Around Town

- Walking: The historic center is small—perfect to explore on foot.
- Taxis: Use taxi stands or ask a restaurant/hotel to call one
- Public Transport: Trams & buses available, but rarely needed in the center

Tip: Streets are cobbled—bring comfy shoes!
